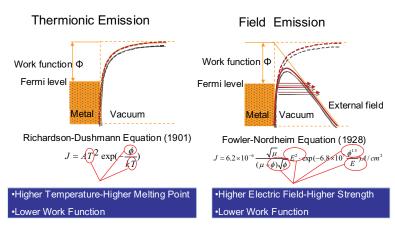

#### **Electron Emission**

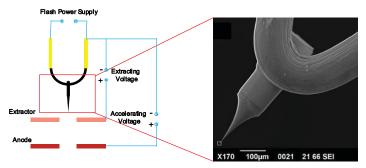




Materials with low work function and high strength are needed.

#### Field Emission Gun





Simplified schematic of a field emission gun

For high electric field, a very sharp tip is needed. The field factor  $\beta = E/V$  can be estimated as 1/5r to 1/100r, where r is the radius of curvature of the tip.

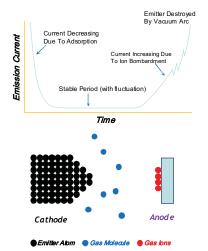

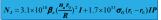

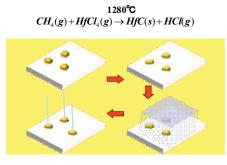
Bombarding lons per Unit Time at the Emitter Surface



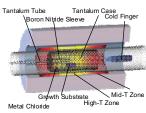
The function S and f are all related to the emitter materials' properties to resist contamination and destruction.

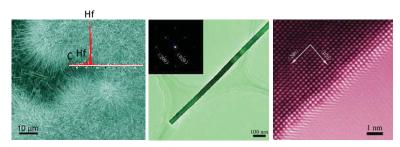
HfC Nanowire Synthesis Schematics

SEM image: HfC Growth Substrate

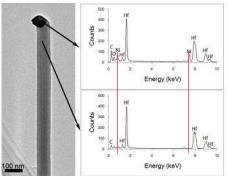
TEM image: Individual HfC Nanowire

This is the *first successful synthesis* on HfC nanowires.

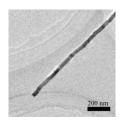
EDS results from a nanowire

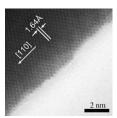
The Ni was only detected in the particle at the tip of the nanowire.

This result indicated the growth of HfC nanowire followed the vapor-liquid-solid (VLS) mechanism.

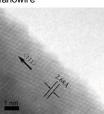

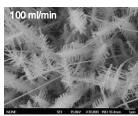


Under different flow rate of CH<sub>4</sub>:





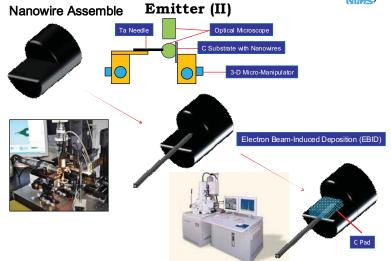

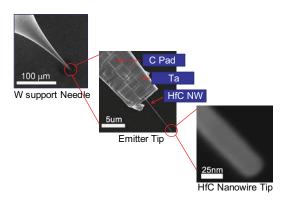

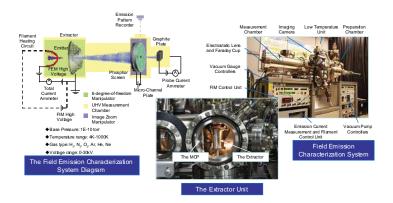


#### Fabrication of Nanowire-Based Field 🥕 Emitter (III) **SEM Images**



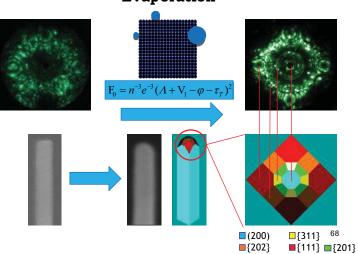






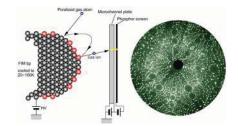
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# Field Ion Microscope (FIM) and Field Evaporation



### Field Ion Microscope (FIM) and Field Evaporation

When the electric field is high enough, the atoms on the surface are pulled out.

Threshold electric field for field evaporation:

 $F_0 = n^{-3}e^{-3}(\Lambda + V_1 - \varphi - \tau_T)^2$ 

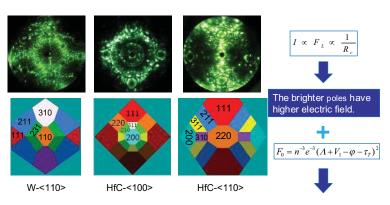
Local brightness:

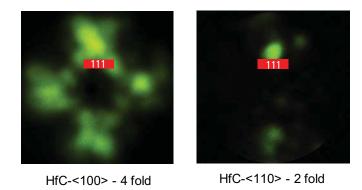

#### Field Emission Pattern

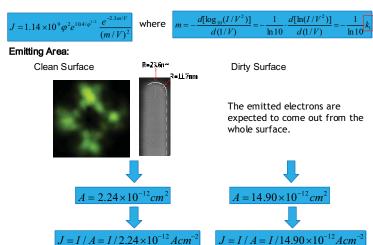




Only {111} areas are bright which means the {111} crystal planes have the lowest work function.

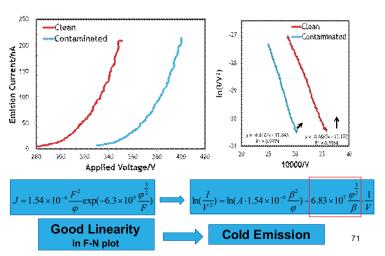

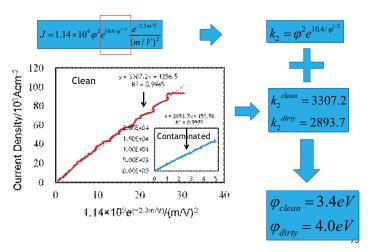
#### **I-V Curve**





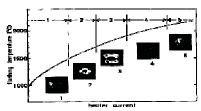

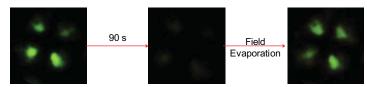

Emission pattern changed with different flash process conditions: 1.Composition deviation; 2. Devastated surface state.



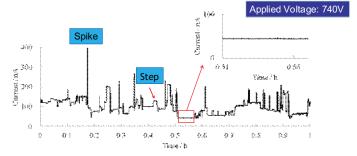

#### Emission Current from an As-Grown Nanowire

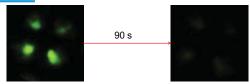


- The noise is step and spike noise similar to C materials which are inert to gas adsorption.
- The step and spike type noises are caused by ions of ambient gas molecules in vacuum ionized by the field emission current.

#### **Emission Stability**

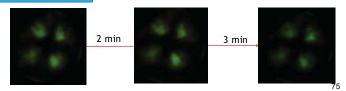


#### At room temperature



The brightness decayed by more than 90%, which was caused by the adsorption of the molecules in the chamber.

#### At liquid N<sub>2</sub> temperature

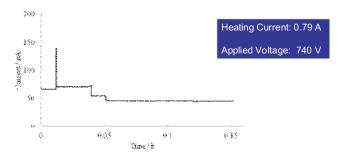


We can expect good stability in a high vacuum condition.

#### **Emission Stability**



Thermal - Assisted Emission Current from an As-Grown Nanowire

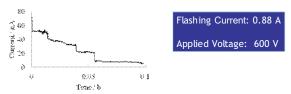


- 1. By heating the tip surface we would expect fewer adsorbed molecules on the surface than at room temperature.
- 2. Heating the tip can remove the dangling bonds of the adsorbed H<sub>2</sub> molecules.7

#### **Emission Stability**



#### Emission Current from a Flashed As-Grown Nanowire



- 1. A fast decay occurred that means the terminated layer of the nanowire became into Hf atoms.
- 2. There are still some steps which means the C layer was not removed completely



After flashed under higher current, the decay was faster and the steps disappeared. The outmost atoms of the tip were totally Hf.

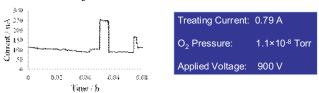
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# Summary

#### **Emission Stability**

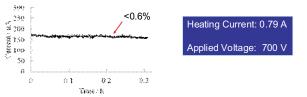


Emission Current from an O<sub>2</sub>-Treated Nanowire



Little decay and fluctuation with only some steps.

Thermal – Assisted Emission Current from an O<sub>2</sub>-Treated Nanowire



Stable emission current with fluctuation noise less than 0.6%.
